However, as one of four girls in her family, funds to pay for college were just not available. AnnaMarie made Tallahassee Community College her college of choice, enrolling in the TCC2FSU program.

The affordability of TCC, the smaller class size and the opportunity for scholarship awards made the decision easy. As a recipient of the D'Alemberte Scholarship, Annamarie has experienced how the generosity of individuals who contribute to scholarship funds can impact a student's life.

"I have received scholarships from TCC that have made college so much easier for me and my parents. My experience at TCC would not have been possible without this assistance and I cannot thank the donors enough for their help. Scholarships can be the difference in a student succeeding, or not and I think it is an amazing thing for people to invest their money into a total stranger. I look forward to paying this debt forward one day as a donor, because I know how important scholarships are and what that money can make possible."

Since graduating from TCC in the spring, AnnaMarie has been accepted to Florida State University. In the fall of 2016, she will begin pursuing her bachelor's degree in psychology with plans to continue on to earn a master's in school psychology. AnnaMarie's choice to participate in TCC's Golden Guarantee program provided her a guided path led by TCC faculty, staff, and advisors that allowed her to graduate with an associate degree in two years and fulfill all the requirements needed to begin the psychology program at FSU.

Everyone has a passion for something in life, and for Richard D’Alemberte that passion is education. D’Alemberte has been an active supporter of Tallahassee Community College for many years. He was a member of TCC’s District Board of Trustees for more than 18 years, and served another decade as a member of the TCC Foundation Board of Directors.

D’Alemberte’s devotion to TCC is driven by the communities around him, and the individuals that make up those communities. “I think that TCC does a wonderful job at providing programs that are suited for our area, and what I find most pleasing is those individuals who choose to stay for employment in our area once their education is complete.”

“All of my children went to TCC at one time or another, and people who live in the Leon, Gadsden, and Wakulla areas are accustomed to small town environments. TCC’s smaller school atmosphere is a wonderful place to begin higher education; it allows individuals to adapt for transitioning to a larger educational environment.

In 1998, Richard D’Alemberte and his wife Jean established the Daniel D’Alemberte Scholarship to honor their son Daniel, once also a TCC student, who perished in a tragic auto accident. The D’Alembertes’ decision to create a scholarship with the TCC Foundation provides tuition support for students, and leaves a legacy for their son that will continue in perpetuity.

Whether it is to get assistance with a sticky math problem, to work together on a history project, or just to find a quiet place to study between classes, the Pankowski Honors Lounge has become the place to be for TCC Honors students since the doors reopened just before the start of the fall semester. The lounge underwent extensive renovations recently funded by long time donors Mary and Joe Pankowski in collaboration with members of the TCC Foundation President's Circle.

Two of Mary and Joe's children attended TCC. This is why they both know first-hand the importance and quality of education provided by TCC. Mary and Joe, as well as their children, believe that TCC provided the foundation their children needed to be successful in their education and careers.

"Whether working individually at the computer stations, interacting collaboratively at the multi-media projection station and tables, or just relaxing on the modern lounge furniture, it's not hard to see the new Pankowski Honors lounge brings a vitality to our students' academic and social development, says Honors Program Director Dr. Robert Fleischman.

Renovations included the addition of square footage and furniture. But, it is the technology upgrades that are most impactful; students and faculty can now connect wirelessly to the projection system with their tablet or other handheld device and the system includes multi-user touchscreen features that can be projected on to any surface.

According to honors student Madelynn Lovelady, "Having the Lounge remodeled was the best thing because it showed the students, including myself, who experienced it before the renovations that the faculty and community truly care about the honors program and would like to see it flourish. Having a comfortable and aesthetically pleasing place to relax and study makes coming to school that much easier. I have definitely noticed a higher volume of traffic throughout the day now that it has been redone. Unlike before, rarely do you find it empty."

The choice to help fund this project has also had an influence on the donors that made it possible. "For us, it was important to partner with our President's Circle members to enhance the TCC Honors Lounge to help attract and retain the best and brightest to TCC," commented Mary Pankowski. "Furthermore, we hope our gift will inspire others who care deeply about the future of TCC to become a part of the TCC Capital Gift Campaign by making a donation to TCC and/or making TCC a part of their estate plan."

The Tallahassee Community College Foundation held a naming ceremony for TCC's Veterans Success Center on February 23. The facility was renamed the Richard W. and Karen B. Moore Veterans Success Center in honor of TCC Trustee Karen Moore and her husband, Richard.

The Moores have long been passionate supporters of TCC and of the College's efforts to serve student veterans. Now, with the assistance of a donation from the Moores, TCC plans to launch the Tallahassee Community College Moore Veterans Leadership Academy Fall 2016. The academy program will span two semesters and allow student veterans to engage with the TCC community as well as the Tallahassee community. The program will focus on education, government, civic engagement, entrepreneurship, health, public safety and other areas. Mentorship will be a valuable component of the program. Each student will receive a scholarship in recognition of successful completion of the academy.

"TCC has such a strong history of supporting veterans who are transitioning into their new lives as students," said Richard Moore, chief operating officer and general counsel of Moore Communications Group. "As a veteran who comes from a long line of fellow service men and women, it has been a privilege to be part of seeing this great new resource become a reality."

Karen Moore, founder and CEO of Moore Communications Group, agreed. "Veterans have contributed so much to our country. As they re-enter our community and workforce, I can think of no better way to honor these men and women than to provide a robust resource to help them continue their education."

The Moores have many strong ties to TCC. Karen is a member of the District Board of Trustees and is the chair of the TCC We Rise Campaign. Their most important connection to TCC is their son, Jarrod, who earned his Associate in Arts degree from TCC in 2012 and then continued his education at Florida State University.

WE ARE TCC

The Tallahassee Community College Foundation’s College Innovation Fund (CIF) Grant Program is designed to encourage and provide financial support for faculty, staff and students to develop and implement innovative projects that will improve the quality or quantity of programs and services at TCC.

“The CIF Grant Program encourages ingenuity and outside-of-the-box thinking for our faculty and staff. This serves as a catalyst for us to actively contribute to, engage in and foster student success inside and outside the classroom,” said Anthony Jones, dean of the Science and Math Division.

Randy McKee, professor of physical science, and Brendan Diamond, assistant professor of physical science, could not agree more. Their project – “TCC Observatory” – was the recipient of a CIF grant for Spring 2016. Their innovative idea was to provide the tools needed for students to take digital images of the moon, sun and planets by equipping the TCC Observatory with a camera and laptop equipped for charge-coupled device imaging. The project was expanded to establish an Astronomy Club on campus, inviting high school students, and people from the community to engage with our students, and faculty.

WE ARE FACULTY

Diamond said that he sees the benefit of this grant in creating a unique role for TCC—bringing high-quality astronomy tools to students and our local community. The initiative can also provide a gateway to science, technology, engineering and mathematics study, as astronomy is a common early interest in science for many people.



WE ARE TCC

The TCC Foundation launched our first exclusive online fundraising effort aimed at alumni, the ONE Campaign, this spring. Alumni were asked to help celebrate our 50th anniversary by making one donation to TCC to acknowledge its impact. Donations up to \$50,000 were matched from a single source and will be used to help fund scholarships, facility upgrades and quality educational programs.

Thanks to many generous alumni, the ONE Campaign surpassed our goal with donations exceeding \$60,000!

Alumni gave for many reasons, but for Scott Harrell, it was an opportunity to give back to his community. “I have known many students who have worked for me and struggled to find assistance while in school. My wife Allison and I have wanted to start a scholarship in the nursing program at TCC for some time. Finally, it came to fruition this past year and we could not be more excited.”

Harrell chose to enroll at TCC because of the class schedules and smaller class sizes. But what he remembers most is, “Professors were super friendly and encouraging, always willing to help out and go the extra mile. TCC helped me ready myself for the next chapter.”

As for TCC’s role in the community: “I think giving students the option of two years at a smaller school to get their feet wet in college is huge. There is a big shock and awe factor when you head off to college.”

The Harrells’ scholarship will help support students by covering tuition and books for years. “I look forward to this lasting relationship with TCC and the Home Instead Senior Care Scholarship fund,” Harrell added.

Classrooms are the most critical place for student learning. A forward-thinking and innovative classroom environment requires comfortable furnishings, a vibrant atmosphere, and dynamic technology. When entering these spaces, students should feel as though they are stepping into the future and into a positive learning environment.

This year the TCC Foundation has unveiled the first of what is expected to be many renovated classrooms, room 121 in the T. K. Wetherell History and Social Sciences Building. Using funds donated through the TCC We Rise Campaign, the classroom has been equipped with a Smart Board and tables and chairs (in lieu of desks) that make group work possible, and are more comfortable for college students, as well as additional fixtures, furniture and technology. The overall look of the room is much more modern and sophisticated, and is better suited for learning.

These renovated classrooms will enhance instruction by communicating high expectations and stimulating intellectual curiosity. The new environment will promote active, experiential, and collaborative learning appropriate to the learner and the subject matter. The technology will support the students' own personal devices and will create a more interactive and engaging experience. Students achieve greater success when they are provided an environment that is not only accessible to technology but also physically comfortable.

WE ARE TCC

This past summer the Able Trust presented Tallahassee Community College with a three-year, \$250,000 grant geared toward providing the tools and support needed by persons with disabilities to secure full-time employment in Gadsden, Leon, and Wakulla counties. TCC was the only college in Florida selected to receive the award this past year and the first applicant in the North Florida region to ever receive it. TCC matched the grant with \$250,000, establishing a \$500,000 effort towards recruiting, retaining and graduating students with disabilities.

“The Able Trust is very honored to partner with TCC and DEO [Department of Economic Opportunity] on this important program to assist students with disabilities to find their career path and obtain employment that leads to their personal success,” said Dr. Susanne Homant, President and CEO of The Able Trust. “TCC has a long history of making sure that job seekers with disabilities are a part of Florida’s workforce and have equal opportunities to contribute to the state’s economy, as well as their own growth.” The Able Trust, created 26 years ago, is a nonprofit public charity focused on providing successful employment opportunities for Floridians with disabilities.

The program is run through TCC’s Workforce Development Division, in coordination with the Disability Support Services office and the Career Center. The primary goal of the program is to help secure job opportunities for individuals who are motivated and geared toward seeking employment. A key component of the grant is case management, with staff working closely with participants to identify skills and talents that support their successful entry into the workforce after they receive job readiness or training services.

The Building Legacies Scholarship was established in 2013 by women who wanted to help others create their own legacy. More than \$30,000 has been raised for an endowed scholarship at TCC through this effort.

HOPS & HALF SHELLS 5K TRAIL RUN/WALK**

The TCC Foundation hosted the first annual Hops & Half Shells 5K Trail Run/Walk at TCC’s Wakulla Environmental Institute on April 23. More than 350 runners and walkers came together along with generous sponsors to raise more than \$5,000 for scholarships for students attending WEI.

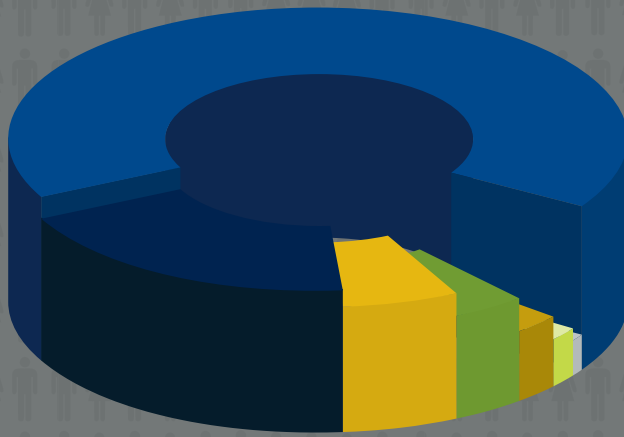

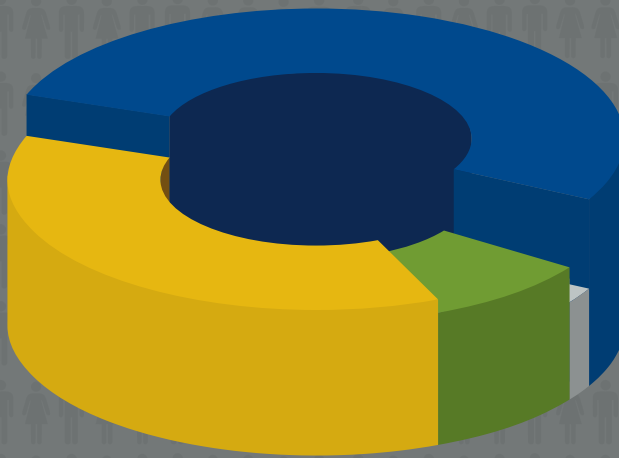
